### Introduction

Asia Pacific Research Centre (2007) defines Energy Security....

"as an ability of an economy to guarantee the availability of energy resource supply in a sustainable and timely manner with the energy price being at a level that will not adversely affect the economic performance of the country."

## **Content Analysis**

• Unit of analysis is a single piece of news article that is covering energy security issues including 'Nuclear Energy', 'Bio-energy (including Palm oil)', 'Dams', 'Gas Exploration and Pipelines', 'Coal Mining' and 'Domestic fuel (such as fuel wood and kerosene).

• Six months from 1<sup>st</sup> July 2008 to 30 September 2008 and 1<sup>st</sup> March to 31<sup>st</sup> May 2009.

## **Qualitative Methodology**

- Interviews (Telephonic and e-mail)
  - Editors of the newspapers
    - 8 newspapers
    - 37.5 percent response
  - Civil Society and Non-Government Organizations (NGOs).
    - 25 Civil Society & NGOs
    - 48 percent response.

  - Environmental News










## Civil Society and NGOs

### CSO's & NGOs views

#### AER

'Very little attention to the negative side of the energy related laws passed by the government.'

#### CETDEM

' Hardly, prominence to the Govt and corporate perspectives.

#### CSIS

'NGO voice is placed only in quotation.'

#### CNIC

'Media contacts them for comments and some publishes their views but the overall coverage is far from balanced.'

#### 'REEEP

'Very few articles emphasized on the detailing of the new energy policies and their implications in the region and country.'

### **Editor's views**

### The Star

'Not enough NGOs in Malaysia that raise concerns on energy security issues.'

### Republika

Mail player in the energy sector is the government, as a result government is the main source.

## Analysis

PM and the Oil Minister or Petroleum Minister is the most quoted followed by the Business houses and corporate or the state owned energy companies.

Common people and civil society got the space when the newspapers talked about the critical conditions but they tend to be left behind when media covered big or strategic energy issues.

No discussion on any issues or government policies.

Environmental and social news also had government and business angle.

## Suggestions for better coverage

- Expand coverage beyond business desk.
- Enhancing skills in journalists.
- Media support of government on these issues?
- Avoiding restrictive and repetitive news.
- Encouraging In-depth and varied voices.
- Publishing research findings.
- Positioning of news articles.
